SO WHAT'S SO UNIQUE ABOUT BEING PRESBYTERIAN?

I'm sure some of you have been caught in situations where someone asks you what church you go to in a casual conversation. You answer, "Oh, Pinnacle Presbyterian Church, it's on the corner of Pima Road and Happy Valley." The other person says, "Yeah, I know where that is. Hey, I've always wondered what's so unique about being Presbyterian? What does that word mean?"

I'm sure for many of you, this is when you get nervous in the conversation. You have no idea what to say as the sweat beads develop on your forehead because you don't want to say something that makes you sound stupid.

So here is a quick survival guide about what you might say:

PRESBYTERIAN IN GREEK IS PRESBUTEROS *Presbuteros* means *elder* and can be found 72 times in the New Testament.

WE ARE A PART OF THE REFORMED TRADITION We come out of the movement of the great reformers beginning in the earlier 16th century: Much of our early reformed theological ideas came from the French lawyer John Calvin.

SOLA SCRIPTURA (Scripture Alone) The early reformers believed that the church had gotten away from the heart of the gospel, so returning to the message of the Bible was central. Today, our whole worship service centers on preparing to hear the Word, proclaiming the Word, and responding to the Word. The service is built around the Scriptures.

ECCLESIA REFORMATA, SEMPER REFORMANDA ("The church reformed, always reforming," according to the Word of God and the call of the Spirit) As Presbyterians we are open to the movement of the Holy Spirit in our life and ministry today. History is important but the Spirit moves and

calls us to change at times as well.

GOD ALONE IS LORD OF THE CONSCIENCE As Presbyterian Margo G. Houts writes, “At its best... (this phrase is) a warning against tyranny by the majority against the minority. When used correctly, it means that ‘my conscience is captive to the Word of God. Only God is Lord of it.’ ”

THE PRIESTHOOD OF ALL BELIEVERS This simply means that all church members, regardless of their occupational choice are called to ministry. Our Book of Order says, “A faithful member accepts Christ’s call to be involved responsibly in the ministry of their Church.” (G-5.0102)

OUR FORM OF GOVERNMENT This stresses active, representational leadership of ministers and lay people. It is why the congregation elects Elders and Deacons as leaders in the church.

PASTOR SEARCH GETS UNDER WAY

The initial focus of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) is preparing the Church Information Form, which describes the church, defines the position and states the expectations under which the minister called will come to the Pinnacle. The CIF also will be used in evaluating candidates.

Once the CIF is written, it must be approved by the Session and the Presbytery, then submitted to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in Louisville, Ky.

The PNC, which was elected at the Jan. 27 Special Congregational Meeting, consists of Greg Barber, Greg Bright, Julie Fiala, Mark Leinweber, Emily Mitchell, Molly Rosenbaum, Tanya Rosenfeld, John Terhune, and Sally Williams. Bill Noyes, Clerk of the Session, is an ex officio member and the Rev. Fran Park represents Committee on Ministry for the Grand Canyon Presbytery.

At its first meeting, the committee elected John Terhune as Chairman, Greg Barber as Vice Chairman, Tanya Rosenfeld as Corresponding Secretary and Greg Bright as Secretary.

All of the members of the PNC are eager to hear your input. Please search them out and take the time to tell them.

NOYES TO PARTICIPATE IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY

For the first time in Pinnacle Presbyterian Church’s 18-year history, one of our elders will be going to the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) General Assembly as an Elder Commissioner from Grand Canyon Presbytery.

Pinnacle’s Clerk of Session, Bill Noyes, will be going to the 218th meeting in San Jose, Calif., from June 19-28. The General Assembly is the highest governing body of the church and is representative of the unity of the synods, presbyteries, sessions and congregations of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). The General Assembly “has the responsibility and power to set priorities for the work of the church in keeping with the church’s mission under Christ...” (Book of Order G-13.0103).

We congratulate Bill on this opportunity to work with our higher governing body.

COMING IN MARCH DURING CHURCH SCHOOL...

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY HOME ON TRACK

The construction of the Habitat for Humanity home that Pinnacle is co-sponsoring is moving along on schedule.

Through February, over 40 members from Pinnacle have provided the “muscle” for framing the home, erecting roof trusses and building interior walls on three Saturdays. Also, two groups of “chefs” from Pinnacle (Amy Dahlby/Shea Augustine and Sally Williams/Jan Premo) have prepared lunch for the volunteers.

The home is being built with working mom Teresa Valenzuela and her two young children, and will take approximately 15 weeks to complete. Over 70 of our fellow members, including the Theology On Tap fellowship, will volunteer over 450 hours of labor during construction.

The volunteer support from our congregation and other Presbyterian churches supplements the minimum of 400 hours of “sweat equity” labor that Valenzuela is required to perform as a down payment on the home. She then repays the direct cost of the home via a no-interest mortgage over 15 to 20 years.

Our congregation is blessed with committed volunteers and with a spirit of sharing reflected in our financial support for this worthwhile project for a deserving family. If you have been unable to help with construction, consider a financial contribution through a State of Arizona program that offers a dollar-for-dollar state tax reduction for cash contributions to Habitat.
